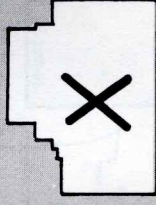

McLEAN COUNTY - The County Board is composed of 27 members elected from nine districts, apportioned by population, with three board members elected in each district. The regular meeting of the Board is the third Tuesday of each month.

CITY OF BLOOMINGTON - TOWN OF NORMAL  
Bloomington and Normal each have the council-manager form of government. Normal's 6 council members are elected by the voters at-large, whereas Bloomington's will be elected from 7 separate wards. Bloomington's ward system was only recently adopted and will go into effect with the 1981 (April 7) Municipal Elections. The mayors of both Bloomington and Normal are elected at-large. Both city councils appoint a professionally-trained city manager who is responsible to the council for supervising and directing the administration of the local government.

SCHOOL DISTRICTS - McLean County is divided into 15 school districts, each governed by a 7-member board. Bloomington is special Charter District No. 87 and Normal is a part of Community Unit District Five. School Board members serve 3-year terms.

TOWNSHIPS - There are 31 townships in McLean County. The Township Supervisor is the chief officer of the township. The Annual Township Meetings are held the second Tuesday in April. See newspaper for time & place.

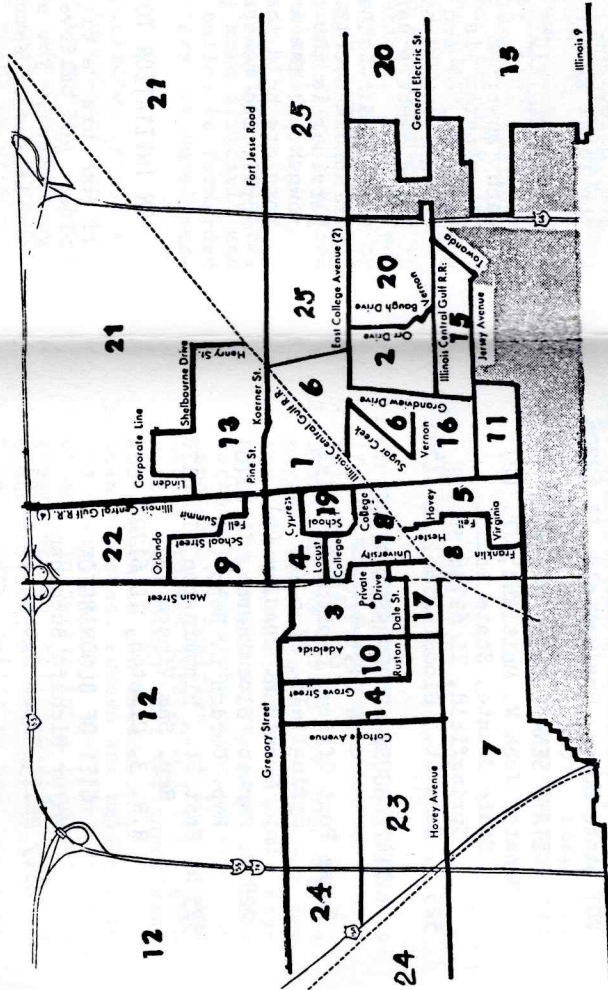

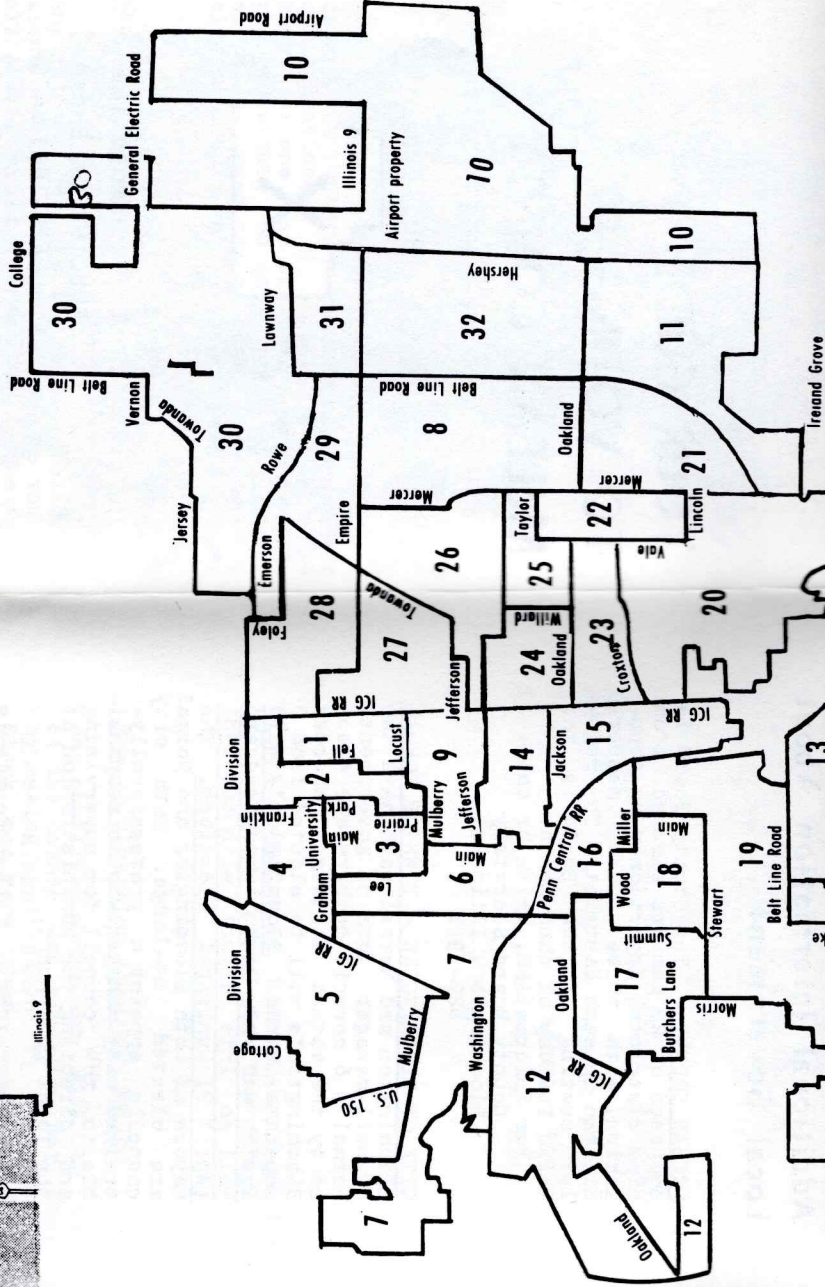


# PRECINCT MAP OF NORMAL

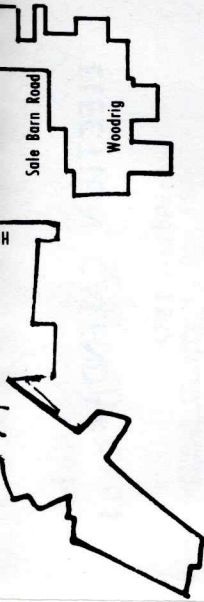

# Voter Information -



## Who May Vote

A qualified voter must be:  
 A United States citizen  
 18 years of age  
 A resident of the precinct for 30 days prior to election day  
 Properly registered  
 In Illinois a citizen must be registered to vote in national, state, county, township, school and park district elections. In certain municipalities of less than 500, however, registration may not be required but voters must have all the other qualifications. A member of the armed forces or one who has been honorably discharged within 60 days previous to an election, need not be registered for any election, but must be otherwise qualified.

## Who May Register

Any citizen who has the above qualifications should register in order to vote in all elections. Once registered, the voter need never register again unless he or she:  
 Fails to vote for 4 years  
 Moves into another election precinct  
 Changes his or her name  
 If a voter moves within the precinct, a notification of the change of address should be sent to the registrar.

## When to Register

Any time in the year except during a period of 28 days before and 2 days after a primary or general election.

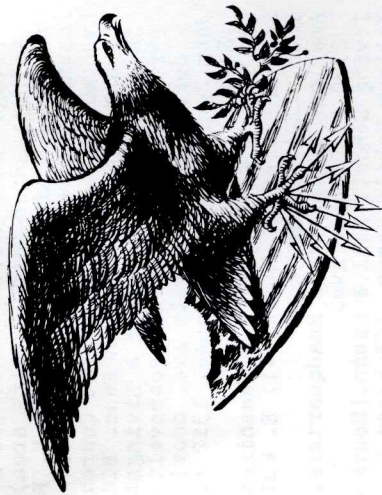

## How to Obtain an Absentee Ballot

Any qualified voter who will be out of the county on election day may, by making application to the County Clerk not more than 30 and not less than 5 days prior to election, receive an affidavit and application to vote absentee. When properly filled out and returned, the clerk will mail a ballot and instructions how to mark. The application and ballot envelope do not need to be notarized. A voter who is going to be out of the County on election day may apply for a ballot in person at the County Clerk's office within 1 day of an election.

A mother, father, sister, brother, husband or wife may make affidavit and application that a ballot be forwarded to a voter in military or naval service.

A permanently incapacitated person will be issued a Voters Identification Card, renewable every five years. A person who is temporarily incapacitated will need an affidavit signed by a physician for the election in which he or she desires to vote.



## Where to Vote and How to Mark Your Ballot

Go to your precinct polling place. (See map inside this folder.) The election judge will give you a ballot(s). All ballots must bear the initials of an election judge. Two methods of voting are used: vote recorder and paper ballots. An election judge will explain how to use the vote recorder and answer questions regarding write-in procedure.

Note: If you spoil a ballot, return it to the election judge and a new one will be given to you.

## Vote Recorders

1. In the voting booth use both hands to insert the ballot card face up in the vote recorder unit.
2. Start at the front of the ballot pages. Read carefully, and punch for your chosen candidates with the stylus. The number on the page and the corresponding arrow coincide with the candidate's position on the ballot card. Proceed through all the pages, voting (punching) for the candidates and issues as you choose.
3. When finished, remove the ballot card and insert it into the envelope provided. To "write-in" a candidate not shown on the ballot pages, use the space provided on the envelope.
4. Turn in your ballot to the election judge. Counting of votes is done quickly and accurately by computer.
