Basically, it boils down to this:

We have all been involved in polluting our water. But we can start un-polluting it now, when the Federal government will help pay most of the cost.

New laws, Federal and State, give us no choice. We must stop this pollution.

By passing the Anti-Pollution Bond Act, as much as 75 to 80% of the money can come from the Bonds and the Federal government. Without the act, your town pays that amount on its own.

On November 3, 1970—that's not far from now—you can do your part to clean up the water of Illinois . . . every creek, every stream, every river. Clean up every single place, so kids can splash in them again, and fish can jump.

On Election Day, November 3, 1970, a history-making proposition will appear on the ballot.

It is called the Anti-Pollution Bond Act.

The Governor has pledged that it will involve no increase in property taxes; and both parties are solidly behind it.

It is built upon a comprehensive plan to help almost every town and city in Illinois to clean up its water with the sewage treatment facilities it needs. And to get the job done for generations to come.

Consulting engineers from all over Illinois helped set up the plan.

(And if you think your community doesn't have a problem, you're dead wrong. There isn't any place in Illinois that doesn't have a polluted water problem and the problem gets bigger every year.)

For every dollar the state puts up, the Federal government will put up two more, as soon as local grant applications are accepted. The total, including local funds, will come out to \$2.2 billion.

It's not a small or skimpy plan. But then, water pollution is not a small problem.

You can lick it, though. If you come to the polls on November 3, vote YES on the Anti-Pollution Bond Act.

If you cast a vote for the state legislature but not for the Anti-Pollution Bond Act, it will count as a No vote.

So you see, if Illinois water stays dirty after November 3, don't blame anybody. Because it will be your fault.
